

The district school apportionment just announced by County Supt. Alma Louise Hart shows a census return of 5,350 children of school age, the per capita apportionment being a fraction over \$11, and the total to be distributed being \$61,131.

The high schools show and average total daily attendance of \$32 students, the total apportionment to the high schools being \$80,639. Of this total the county high school at Lewistown receives \$39,196, the Moore school coming next with \$5.345 and Denton being third with \$4,002.

Moneys Are Apportioned to Various Districts in Jefferson County.

BOULDER, Dec. 24—(Special)—
Apportionment of the general school
fund of Jefferson county was recently
completed in the office of Miss Nell
McCauley, county superintendent of
schools. The total amount to be apportioned was \$19,036.75. This amount
was divided among 1,137 census children in 27 districts, making a per
capita apportionment of \$18.7429.
Whitchall, the largest district in
the county, with a total census number of 468, received an opportionment
of \$7.835.69. Boulder, the second largest district, with a census number of
176, received \$2.946.75, while Basin,
the third largest district, received
\$1,222.23 for a census number of 73.
The district to receive the smallest
share in the opportionment was Millgan, with a census total of only 2.

601.28 was placed in the general funds
of the various school districts of the

Of the \$19,038.75 distributed \$18,-601.28 was placed in the general funds of the various school districts of the county while \$435.47 was placed in the various library funds. The total amount distributed this year exceeds the amount distributed last year by \$2,018.56, while the per capita apportionment this year exceeds that of last year by \$2.42.

Sells Aviation

Man Who Directs State Aviation Activities, Selling Airport Ideas, Points to Future of Air Travel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 24.— Meet the man whose job it is to sell viation to Californians.

R. E. Fisher would modestly deny the implied compliment, but his avia-tion committee of a state-wide cham-ber of commerce has directed the progress of more phases of aeronautics than any other agency in the state.

Fisher considers the prime requisite of aviation to be safe and sound landing fields and airports—and plenty of 'em. In other words, people will fall safer in flying over a commercial airme to see a landing field every 15 miles than to spot one every 50 miles.

Results of Activity.

As a result of this committee's work California has 188 landing fleids and airports. Of these, 75 are pub licly owned. "We in California," says

"believe aviation has arrived definitely as a factor in our daily life, and that it will advance only as organized intelligence directs it. "Chambers of commerce everywher

can play vital parts in promoting aviation in their regions, but their work will become vastly more effective if they get together in a sort of state chamber of commerce. That is what we have done.

"There are four major divisions we have mind working for the promotion."

bear in mind working for the promotion of aeronautics: Want Aviation Laws.

These are development and improvement of landing fields, formation of sound aviation laws, development

of aviation manufacturing and public education and information on the

edication and information on the safety and utility of airplanes."

Fisher spends considerable time in trying to harmonize urban and rural points of view with reference to avlation. His committee considers seronautical problems from the general points of view of state unity, co-ord-ination of all sections, statewide ac-

mation or all sections, statewide ac-tion, legislative action and political expression.

No matter what may be said of Fisher's ability as a salesman, the state admits he has sold the idea of state admits no ties soid the idea of airports. Because of his expert ef-forts, one may fly the length of the state from Oregon to Mexico and find at regular intervals a handing field. And every community of size has an equipped airport.
