John Warren, 19, of 5518 East Seventeenth street, Oakland, Gaskin's self-confessed companion on his banditty careet, was allowed by the Berkeley police last night. The name of the 16-year-old girl, the companion of the two youths on their wild drive in which they engaged in a gun duel with Patrolman Harold Schulz on Tuesday right, is being withheld by the Berkeley police because of her age. Bullet Fired Through Window in Federal Building Believed Attempt to Kill Asst. Atty.-Gen. K.C. Gillis

Official Leaves S. F. Office Earlier Than Usual and Finds Missile Lying on the Floor Upon His Return

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26,---The possibility that some one may have sought to assassinate Kenneth C. Gillis, assistant to the attorney general in charge of prosecutions under the Volstead act, was rerealed today when it was discovered that a shot had been fired through his window in the Federal building.

Department of justice agents began an immediate investigation, and after reconstructing the situation came to the conclusion that had Gillis been seated at his desk he would have been wounded by the shot. When Gillis reached his office

today he found a 30-30 bullet lying

near a filing cabinet. He picked

it up curiously, and was startled to discover that there was a hole in the window. It had been fired directly toward his chair. Gillis' office is on the top floor of the Federal building, facing Sixth street. The attorney left his office earlier than usual Wednesday afternoon, and it probably was

at that time that the shot was Gillis was inclined to take the situation seriously, and Special Agent Martin Fahey, of the Department of Justice and Captain Thomas B. Foster of the secret service, who conducted an inquiry,
